Jesse Ernest Wilkins Jr. (1923 - 2011)
President of the American Nuclear Society and a Professor at Harvard. He started his Ph.D. at age 13 and finished it at age 19.

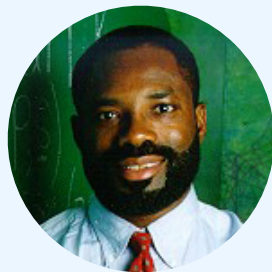


Evelyn Boyd Granville (1924 -)
Second African-American woman to earn a Ph.D. in mathematics. She worked on the Mercury and Vanguard projects.



Gladys Mae West (1930 -)
American mathematician known for her contributions to satellite positioning systems.

TECHNOLOGIES



Dr. Philip Emeagwali (1954 -)
Nigerian computer scientist, known as the "Bill Gates" of Africa. He invented the fastest computer in 1989, which did 3.1 billion calculations per second.



Mark Dean (1957 -)
First African-American to receive the IBM Honorary Fellowship.



John Henry Thompson (1959 -)
Inventor of the Lingo programming language and developer of Flash and Shockwave software.

NASA WOMEN



Dorothy Vaughan (1910 - 2008)
First African-American NASA supervisor



Katherine Johnson (1918 - 2020)
Hired as a "human computer" at NASA, worked on calculations for the Apollo mission.



Mary Jackson (1921 - 2005)
Hired as a "human computer" she was NASA's first African-American woman engineer.



Mae C. Jemison (1956 -)
Brilliant American engineer, physician, professor and NASA astronaut.
